TRADITIONAL CHINESE DRESS (QIPAO/ CHEONGSAM) CONSTRUCTION

Cross-Shaped One-Piece Cheongsam Pattern Design

(1) Style Description

This style was popular during the 1920-30s, and the cutting method follows the traditional Chinese cross-shaped flat structure.

For the summer cheongsam, the length extends below the knees up to floor length. It features a right-side overlapping front, a semi-fitted waist along the side seams, a standing collar, and integrated front and back panels with short sleeves. The front and back are cut in one piece without shoulder seams. There are low slits on both sides below the knees. The cheongsam has a total of nine buttons, a slightly tapered hem, and a curved lower edge. The collar, sleeves, front overlap, hem, and slit openings are all trimmed. This style inherits the characteristics of traditional Chinese robe, adopts a cross-shaped flat structure, and is easier to cut than the 1960's fitted version (see Figure below)

(2) Fabric


The fabrics are usually cotton, printed fabric, silk, brocade, and satin.

(3) Key Points for Pattern Making

The main structure includes the standing collar, whole body of the garment, and a right-side under piece along the buttoned area..




PATTERN LAYOUT AND DIMENSIONS
